

President Truman

- The war required that the steel mills remain in operation.
- A steel industry strike would sacrifice
 America's national defense and the lives of American soldiers.
- "Inherent powers" in the constitution supported the executive power vested in a president; shall be Commander in Chief during a national emergency.



Youngstown Sheet & Tube Company v. Sawyer (referred to as the Steel Seizure Case)

In a 6-3 decision this was a landmark
United States Supreme Court decision
that limited the power of the President
of the United States to seize private
property.

- "The President's power, if any, to issue the order must stem either from an act of Congress or from the Constitution itself." There had been no act of Congress, so the Court turned to the Constitution.
- The Court ruled that the President's role of Commander in Chief power did not authorize the action, and neither did the "several constitutional provisions that grant executive power to the President.
