Mrs. Hoover Invites Congressman's Wife to Tea At the White House

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 13.
—(By C. N. S.)—Mrs. Oscar DePriest was a guest at the White
House on the afternoon of June 12,
when Mrs. Hoover entertained at
one of a series of teas in honor of
the wives and relatives of the congressional group.

Mrs. DePriest wore a charming afternoon ensemble of the loveliest pale blue georgette. The simplicity of the costume was relieved only by a beautiful rhinestone buckle, on the left side of the finely pleated skirt. A coat, the shortest of jackets, completed the costume.

She wore a large hat of rosygray hair braid, trimmed with a cluster of hand-cut dove-ray velvet leaves, and a velvet rose placed modishly on the underbrim, framed her face becomingly. She carried a lovely bag which matched her hat, rosy-gray watersnake slippers, and a large pointed fox scarf.

Mrs. DePriest was graciously received both by Mrs. Hoover and the ladies of the cabinet, who, as usual, assisted in entertaining.

The invitation to tea was delivered to Mrs. DePriest by messenger last Wednesday. It was engraved on a heavy vellum card, carrying the White House insignia, and read:

## Recognition Of Representative DePriest By Hoovers Is Causing Stir In Washington

16.—The WASHINGTON, June social recognition of Mrs. Oscar De-Priest, wife of the negro congressman from the first Illinois district, at the White House has dimmed the Hoover popularity in the south, and made it very embarrassing for such public men as Senator F. M. Simmons, of North Carolina; Senator Thomas Heflin, of Alabama; Bishop James Cannon jr., of Virginia, and others who bolted Gov. Alfred E. Smith in the late campaign.

Southern congressmen, generally, Republicans as well as Democrats, think that the president and Mrs. Hoover have made a great and irreparable mistake.

Asked today if the president would comment on the matter the White House answered in the negative.

Congressman DePriest," said Senator Simmons, one of the irreconcilable anti-Smith Democrats, "was exceedingly unfortunate, and much to be regretted."

"It was a great blow to the social stability of the south," said Senator Lee S. Overman, of North Carolina. "I regret the incident beyond

measure," declared Senator Morris Sheppard, of Texas, "It is recognition of social equality between the white and black races and is fraught with infinite danger to our white civilization.

"I deplore it very much; it was a mistake," Senator Heflin said.

Last fall, soon after he was elected, it became known that Mrs. Vestal, wife of Representative Albert H. This, it was asserted at the time, was aimed at Mrs. De Priest.

In turn, De Priest has stricken Vestals and Pritchards from his invitation list. Dear Mrs. Woover.

My WIFE and I are dumb-founded tonight to read in the papers that you have entertained a nigger lady, the WIFE of Congressman elect DePriest of Chicago, Ill.

This makes a great out in our appreciation of you as an AMERICAN citizen. It knocks the bottom of WHITE SUPREMACY in a cooked-hat. In fact, its too degrading for an argument. It places them on an equality with the CAUCASIAN RACE, and assists for the amalgamation of the races.

I fear you do not understand the amount of damage you have done to this Country. The writer would feel very unpatriotic to his Country if he would allow himself to sit by a nigger in any dining room, including the MOME. I know and you ought to know that the nigger cannot be handled in this manner and be considered successful for these United States. I'll admit however its a nigger vote getter for your distinguished husband, whom we all supported because of the fact we wanted an AMERICAN on guard at Washington, D. C.

You must remember we already have 3,000,000 mulattoes in this Country, and now you encourage them as being your equal, making the younger set of nigger girls and boys feel as if they were good enough to intermarry with your Son, and the Sons and Daughters of other AMERICAN families.

I wonder if the Northern people will ever wake up to the fact that the nigger cannot be handled that way, and be a safe factor to contend with. The nigger is here and I want him to be a nigger (stay black). I want him to also have a nigger's job. WHITE SUPREMACY must prevail in AMERICA. If it does not, in another 100 years at the rate we are going, we will be 50 per cent. malattees. Do you think that is good for this Country?

The correct solution of the nigger question is their complete disfranchisement by Constitutional Amendment and to treat him more like a hound dog, than a guest at your table at tea. Then you will not have him dictating to you and on an equality with the CAUCASIAN RACE.



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## Discharge Petition #14 Filed by Oscar De Priest Regarding H. Res. 236, a Resolution to Prevent Discrimination, 01/24/1934 - 03/05/1934

This resolution and discharge petition from Representative Oscar De Priest, a Republican from Illinois, attempted to end racial discrimination in the House of Representatives' Restaurant. De Priest introduced H. Res. 236 to the House, which called for the creation of a special committee to investigate the House Restaurant's refusal to serve two African Americans, one of whom was a member of his staff. When the resolution stalled in the Rules Committee, De Priest successfully used a discharge petition to move the bill out and onto the House floor.
